Commanding Officer's Message




Dear Camp Fuji Families and Friends,

Thank you all for your continued support of your dedicated Marines/Sailors/Civilian employees of Camp Fuji. We have achieved many successful accomplishments since the last newsletter ranging from training unit support, development of our people, and strengthening of our alliance.

Notably, our installation hosted Exercise Fuji Viper for 1st Bn 3rd Marine Regiment from January to March. During this exercise, Marines successfully employed several Unmanned Aerial System aircraft while in support of combined arms training.

In March, our installation hosted the first large scale, bilateral, multi-domain exercise with the 31st Marine Expeditionary Unit and the Japanese Amphibious Rapid Deployment Brigade known as the Maritime Defense Exercise (MDX). MDX was notable for its bilateral amphibious landings at our nearby training beach at Numazu, the first ever air-ground integrated training using Japanese V-22 tilt-rotor Osprey aircraft, and the first ever bilateral flight of Japanese V-22 and US Marine Corps MV-22 Osprey aircraft. F35 Joint Strike Fighters were also employed in this exercise.



These are just the highlights of a very busy quarter for our Camp Fuji team. SgtMaj Paz and I are very proud and constantly amazed at the performance, maturity, and dedication of our team.

With that said, my time here at Camp Fuji is rapidly coming to an end. My family and I will be moving back to the US from Camp Fuji next month. I will likely be serving my final assignment in the Marine Corps at the University of Colorado's Naval ROTC program in Boulder, Colorado. I will turn the command over to Col Neil Owens coming over from Okinawa. He is a long time friend of mine and an outstanding leader. He will prove to be a great addition to the Camp Fuji team.

It has been my utmost privilege and honor to serve with your loved one here at Camp Fuji. I only wish it would have been easier to meet our family members that are mostly back in the US and tell you directly how proud SgtMaj Paz and I of your loved ones serving here at Camp Fuji!

CATC Camp Fuji's Fight Against COVID-19

As of January 13, 2022, we have a total of 41 COVID-19 positive cases associated with CATC Camp Fuji tenant and visiting unit organizations. Over the next 3 days, we expect over 20 of our positive cases to be fully recovered and medically cleared. For the past 3 days, we have not recorded any additional community spread cases suggesting that our mitigation measures are beginning to demonstrate effectiveness. None of our cases required hospitalization.


Counter Omicron Operations Order

<u>Commander's Intent</u>: We will treat this omicron outbreak as just another enemy that we will orient towards and vanquish. When Marines fully understand our identified threats, we gain unity of effort and alignment of purpose to prevail on this battlefield.


<u>Purpose</u>: Level set the installation on the current omicron outbreak situation, provide my intent on how we will defeat this enemy, and guide our returning Marines from CONUS leave that are not yet aware of the completely and suddenly changed COVID situation at Camp Fuji with the aim of preserving the health of our force and accomplishing all of our installation tasks.

Method: We will attack this omicron outbreak head-on in 3 phases. Phase I will consist of shaping operations such as reorganization, preparation, and booster shots. Phase 2 is our decisive phase focused on slowing the spread. Phase 3 will consist of steady-state containment and posture. The phases will not necessarily be sequential, they could be simultaneous and/or cyclical and shifting whatever is necessary to adapt to the evolving threat.

<u>Desired state</u>: Omicron or subsequent COVID-19 variants are contained and defeated. Mitigation measures are used to contain spread on and off-base, the health of our entire team of Marines/Sailors/US and Japanese civilian employees is protected, our host nation is assured of our diligent efforts, and that CATC Camp Fuji is capable of continuing all of its assigned missions without interruption.







For the past two weeks, we have greatly reduced community spread cases to nearly zero within the installation. Our quick individual and organizational actions to include aggressive mitigation measures, booster shots, testing, and quarantine have proven very effective.

Explosive Ordnance Disposal









On 25 January 2022, personnel from CATC Fuji EOD Section participated in Post Blast Analysis training aboard Demo 3, IOT build upon skills learned in the employment of Sensitive Site Exploitation (SSE), and to establish a base line knowledge of how to identify exploitable information after an explosive event or enemy weapon strike.









CATC Fuji EOD Section along with two EOD Technicians from MCAS Iwakuni conducted a weekly bi-lateral Operational Area Clearance (Range Sweep) in the TA-1 impact area, in order to remove and dispose of any Unexploded Ordnance (UXO). All UXO items discovered during this range sweep were properly disposed of by detonation in TA-1 upon completion of the operation.


